

- 2 severely limited Chinese migration to the United States
- 7 headed by Terrance Powderly; organized skilled and unskilled workers, males and females, and all races; collapsed when public opinion turned against it after the Haymarket Square Riot
- 8 largest silver strike in nation's history; Virginia City established; located in Nevada
- 9 its completion linked the East coast to the West coast; labor supplied by Irish and Chinese laborers
- 11 the nation's first major strike; violence and death; ended when President Hayes sent in

- federal troops 12 solution to lack of building space in cities; made possible by the availability of steel
- 15 key component of industrialization and urban growth; consumer and transporter of raw materials and manufactured goods; new cities emerge; growth of older cities 🗆 🗀
- 16 immigrants from Southern and Eastern Europe; poor, Jewish and Catholic
- 18 business philosophy which believed only the strongest and most successful businesses would survive; based upon Charles Darwin's "survival of the fittest" theory of evolution; promoted by capitalists such as John D.

- include the ability to raise large amounts of capital, permanence, and limited liability
- 4 enabled factories to locate away from water and operate 24 hours a day
- 5 promoted by Andrew Carnegie; the belief that the wealthy should be stewards of society through the distribution of wealth in order to improve society
- 6 an order to cease an activity; issued by the courts in support of business; used to break strikes
- 10 wrote about political corroption

- and the political machine in "The Shame of the Cities"
- 13 a political organization which controlled politics at the local level; often corrupt; maintained power by committing voter fraud and performance of favors; dominant in large cities with growing immigrant populations; associated with the Democratic party
- 14 political machine in New York City; controlled by Boss Tweed
- 17 published "How the other Half Lives"; exposed the terrible living conditions of city slums and tenements
- 19 housing units in cities in which immigrants lived; poorly maintained and overcrowded 21 promotion of

native-born peoples; antiimmigrant sentiment
